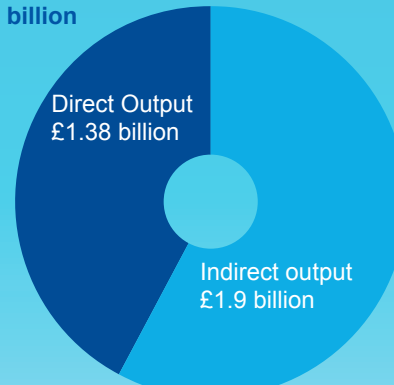


Economic Impact of East Midlands Universities

Universities in the East Midlands make a significant contribution to the economy as businesses in their own right, at both a regional and national level. In 2007/8 the East Midlands universities:

- Had a combined income of £13.8 billion.
- Generated £3.3 billion output in the UK.
- Employed over 25,000 staff contributing directly and indirectly to the employment of almost 50,000 FTE in the UK.

Total Output of EM Universities 2007/8: £3.3 billion

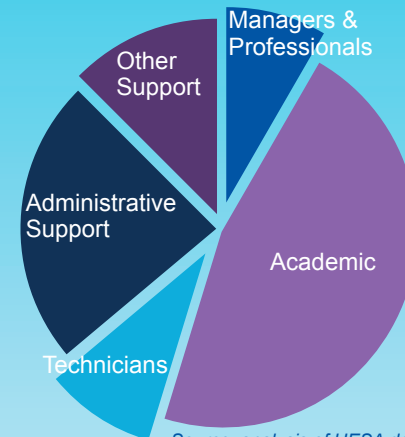

For every £1 million of university output a further £1.38 million of output is generated in other sectors of the economy

Our universities are major regional employers, with a total of 25,000 staff. For every 100 jobs created within a university, 103 are generated elsewhere in the economy.

Distribution of Staff in EM Universities

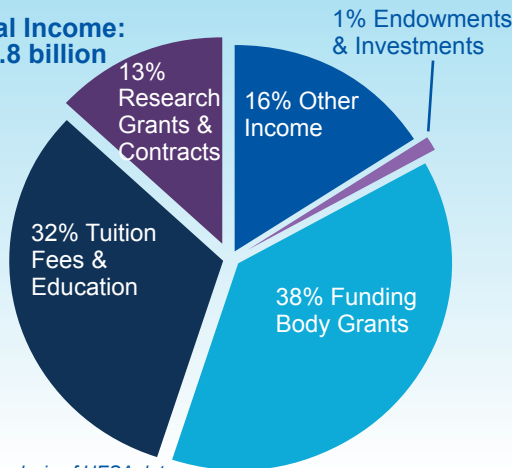

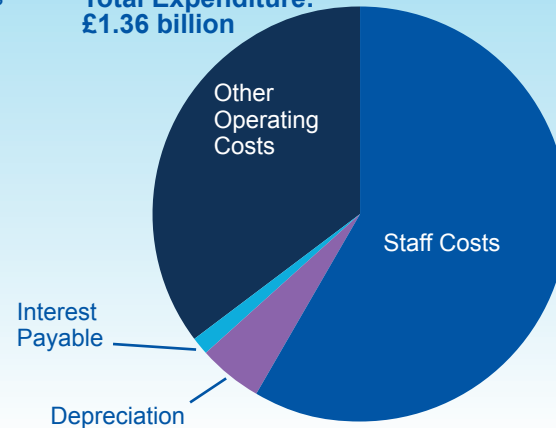

Higher Education is one of the most effective sectors in generating GDP per £1 million unit of expenditure and per capita GDP. Overall the Higher Education sector in the UK contributed £33.4 billion to GDP in 2007/08.
